




THE CITY OF PLYMOUTH

Plymouth is located in the beautiful south west of England – an idyllic location for leisure and learning, with plenty of quiet spaces and recreational opportunities.

Located in Devon on the boarder with Cornwall, Plymouth is graced with a setting among the finest in Europe. Its enviable location makes it the ideal place to study, visit and live.



As the largest city in the South West with a population of over 250,000 people, Plymouth enjoys a combination of modern city living and rural charm. With excellent national transport links, great shopping and culture, top sporting opportunities, pristine seas and south coast sunshine, studying with us lets you live the lifestyle that only the South West Peninsula can offer. It is about three-and-a-half hours by train to London, with ferry links to France and Spain.

Plymouth's historical heart is the Barbican area with its narrow Elizabethan cobbled streets. Here you will find the Plymouth Gin Distillery, home to Plymouth Gin since 1793 and England's oldest working gin distillery. Also on the Barbican is one of its most popular tourist attractions, the National Marine Aquarium which boasts Europe's deepest tank. Close by are the Mayflower Steps, belived to be near where the Pilgrim Fathers finally set sail for the New World in 1620.






THE UNIVERSITY OF PLYMOUTH

The University's mission is to advance knowledge and transform lives through education and research. We are one of the UK's leading modern universities, ranked 5th place in the UK in the *Times Higher Education (THE)* Young University rankings 2022. Three times awarded The Queen's Anniversary Prize for Higher Education, we were also the first university in the world to receive the Social Enterprise Mark. The University of Plymouth has 150 partnerships from 26 countries for collaboration in teaching and research and more than three quarters of our research was ranked either World-Leading or Internationally Excellent in the 2021 Research Excellence Framework (REF).




Our appointed Student Ambassadors will ensure your safety and wellbeing and provide you with an alternative source of support if needed.

ACADEMIC SESSION EXAMPLES

HISTORY OF THE EDUCATION SYSTEM IN THE UK

Dr Nick Pratt

In this session we will briefly look at the complex history of education in the UK; how schools came about in different forms at different times and the role of religious organisations, the state and industrial organisations in creating our education system. In addition to the structure of the system, we will consider how the physical buildings and systems of organisation interrelate with different views on what education is for, arriving at the present day and the global education market. By considering the UK system, I hope that participants will be able to make connections with their own systems elsewhere in the world and use this to better understand the relationship between their own schools and the international context they are in.

VULNERABILITY AND KINDNESS AS A TEACHING METHOD

Dr Emma Macleod-Johnstone

In this short workshop, we will be exploring the impact of 'vulnerability' in student-teacher relationships and the connections formed through 'acts of kindnesses'. These moments have the potential for mutually transformative learning as we consider: What is it to be vulnerable? Why can showing 'vulnerability as an act of kind-ness', through the power of example, be such a potent strength in teaching and learning?

CAN INTERNATIONAL PERSPECTIVES HELP PAINT A DIFFERENT PICTURE FOR THE FUTURE OF ENGLAND'S EDUCATION SYSTEM?

Dr Naomi Sani

From 'mathematics mastery' to 'the purpose of problem solving' to 'concentrating on cognitive challenge' to 'post-pandemic pupil well-being' - what can international comparisons teach us? This is a pivotal moment in educational history. The Covid-19 pandemic has 'forced' innovation and galvanised the education community to be strong and adaptive - and to focus on equity in society. There could be no better time to consider the quality and efficacy of our education systems. Dialogue, collaboration, conversation - on a global scale - could deliver considerable rewards from learning from others.

MULTICULTURAL CURRICULUM TO FACILITATE INCLUSIVE EDUCATION IN MAINSTREAM PRIMARY SCHOOLS.

Suparna Bagchi

This session will explore insights into how a multicultural curriculum might facilitate the inclusion of children from diverse communities in the mainstream education system. The workshop will evoke an interactive discussion on how the issues of community cohesion, cultural diversity, and race equality can be addressed through a curriculum by incorporating multiculturalism both in theory and practice.

EARLY READING AND PHONICS IN THE PRIMARY ENGLISH CURRICULUM

Jo Hawkes

With around 44 different sounds in the English language but only 26 letters to represent these, how do we teach children to read in English primary schools? This workshop will look at how we use Phonics as a key to unlocking the written code of English and give plenty of opportunity for practising games and activities that help. Come along with your fingers ready to tap out and your tongues ready to get in a twist!

ACADEMIC SESSION EXAMPLES

BOAT TO MOUNT BATTEN AND WALK TO TURNCHAPEL HISTORY WALK

Dr Harriet Dismore

Enjoy the short ferry ride from the Barbican to Mount Batten before a little walk along the marina to the waterside village of Turnchapel. Here you will learn about shipbuilders, sea pilots and smugglers, as well as the remains of 17th century workers discovered just a few years ago in an old allotment! We will finish our walk with a drink at one of the local pubs, taking in some of the best views of Plymouth across the Cattewater.

PRIMARY SCIENCE PRACTICAL IDEAS AND LEARNING OUTSIDE THE CLASSROOM

Kelly Davis

During this workshop you will have the opportunity to take part in and learn some exciting and wow factor science experiments aimed at children between the ages of 3-11. We will also go outside and think about how we can integrate learning outside into our practical teaching of science.

21ST CENTURY SKILLS

Dr Janet Georgeson

Schoolchildren today growing up to face complex, changing environments 'where creativity, innovation, initiative, entrepreneurship and commitment to continuous learning are as important as knowledge' (Caena, 2011: 2). For children and young people to acquire the complex and analytical skills and dispositions needed to adapt to such environments, schools should provide appropriate teaching to develop students' '21st century skills' - collaboration, creativity, ICT (information and communication technology), communication and criticality/problem-solving. However we must be careful that we do not introduce barriers to the development of 21st century skills by limited access to - and overreliance on - technology. We will explore how educators across the age range introduce 21st skills into their teaching to help towards SDG 4: Ensure inclusive and equitable quality education and promote lifelong learning opportunities for all.

HOW DOES SATELLITE NAVIGATION WORK?

Professor David Burghes

Sat Nav technology depends on using Satellites to monitor traffic but how many satellites are needed and how do they stay stationary about the earth? We will also explore how the satellites decide on the best route for you to take from position A to position B and the assumptions made to give you the optimum route.

MEALS


Breakfast may be provided (subject to availability) in the course fee, but you will need to buy your own lunches and evening meals. We will be able to advise you on places to do this.
